Love is more than just a happy ending

A summer between prefabricated buildings and outdoor swimming pools. While others go on holiday, twelve-year-old Henri and her best friend Mo share a tube of sunscreen and exchange secret glances. They carry large stacks of books home from the library, read Stephen King and Kafka, and have permission to visit the adult section. Afternoons spent in quiet intimacy on the lawn or the rooftop turn into something more: a bond, a love that sustains them both while everything else falters and falls apart.

Because Henri is worried about her father. Usually he is funny and caring – he, the policeman who listens to his Depeche Mode tape in the morning and tenderly ruffles her hair. Now he is acting all strange, vandalizing his own backyard; something has taken hold of him that splits his personality.

Together with her mother, Henri tries to take care of her father and to conceal his mental illness. Not quite ideal conditions for growing up in peace. Henri seeks refuge in her relationship with Mo – and she writes. Stories full of ghosts, to find the words for what is happening to her family. And to save her father.

Concrete Palace is an intense, wise and deeply moving novel about love and the ghosts that no one calls upon but which come along nonetheless.

Mara Floren grew up in the 1980s in a West German high-rise housing complex, among other places. She worked for over ten years in German theaters in various roles behind the scenes. Today, Floren lives near Berlin, devotes herself to writing, and works as an anti-bullying coach in schools.

Laura Freudenthaler *Iris* Novel Roughly 228 pages 18 February 2026

Iris is a writer who travels extensively in Europe and beyond. She finds moments of understanding in the encounters she has along the way. Moments of affirmation in a life that is on the verge of exhaustion, in a world that feeds on the cultural heritage



of the past, which seems threatened everywhere. Back home, she talks about it, and Anton listens to her and shows Iris the photos he takes as an artist with damaged cameras. Her relationship with Anton (and other men) is based on agreements, including sexual ones. Violence and submission play an increasingly important role in this. Also in Iris' imagination, which begins to be ignited by the history of witch trials, by this and other stories of violence that have been inscribed on the female body over the centuries.

Twenty-four hours that change everything

At first, it seems like any other day – people meet in cafés, look forward to dates, argue with each other. A little girl has a sense of foreboding. When suddenly a violent crime occurs, a dynamic is set in motion that affects the lives of various people. A long-absent father reconnects with his daughter, a young woman dies under mysterious circumstances. An older gay couple finds their way out of a relationship crisis, and a successful manager realizes that he has made a big mistake. In a mysterious way, the lives of numerous people in the city seem to be intertwined. A fast-paced episodic novel that asks all of life's big questions within twenty-four hours.

Elke Cremer, born in Ludwigshafen in 1975, studied literature and musicology in Freiburg, Munich, and Florence and lives in Berlin as an author and film writer. For her literary work she received the annual literature scholarship from the Baden-Württemberg Art Foundation and the poetry promotion prize from GEDOK Heidelberg. So far, her publications include the poetry booklet *Lines Made of Bees* and, in 2022, the poetry collection *Elevation without Houses*. In 2017, 2022, and 2023 she received the German Audio Film Award.

Ulrike Almut Sandig *In the Hurricane* Novel Roughly 208 pages 18 February 2026

Overnight, the streets of Wolnopol change: dunes blow across the promenade, artificial-looking tornadoes tear swathes through the Ukrainian coastal town. What appears to be a natural phenomenon quickly turns out to be an existential



threat. Are the storms coming from the east? Can the people and the town hold out against them?

Amidst this chaos, Maksym builds his career – dealing with synthetic drugs. His grandfather Bohdan, who survived the Gulag, teaches him chess and quotes Pushkin. His mother Nadia, a heart surgeon at the municipal hospital, trusts neither the state nor the people. Like Bohdan, she tries not to pass on the traces of the Soviet dictatorship to Maksym.

But as the city threatens to vanish into the sand, the family begins to falter as well. Even though Maksym thinks of his drug business as a game, he is already trapped in a dangerous spiral of power, addiction and violence.

With poetic clarity, Ulrike Almut Sandig's new novel poses the pressing questions of our time: How much do we need each other in the storm? And what is the price of our freedom?

A comforting book about letting go

A young artist and mother has to say goodbye to her beloved uncle, who is dying. Inevitably she is reminded of her father, who left her family when she was a child. While dealing with this dual pain, she begins to take an increasing interest in limestone. After all, she always enjoyed going to the mountains with her brother.

By contrasting the abstract with something concrete, by uncovering fossils in limestone or visiting a lime kiln, she finds her own way of coping with her grief. In the process, she not only learns a lot about herself, but also about nature, and along the way, she forms lasting friendships. A novel – as poetic as it is wise – about transience, reconciliation, and the substance life is made of.

Laura Vogt, born in 1989 in eastern Switzerland, studied cultural studies at the University of Lucerne and creative writing at the Swiss Literature Institute in Biel. Her published novels include *The Woman Lying Down* (2023), *As Far as We Are Concerned* (2020), and *So it Was That Easy to Leave* (2016). Her work has been recognized with various grants and scholarships and partially translated into English. She lives with her family near St. Gallen.

There is also a man in her life, but he is married. When he dies unexpectedly, all Rosa is left with is the camper van he once gave her. But what is she supposed to do with it? Is it a chance for a different life, perhaps her last?

Trust only in longing, not in injury. This sentence stayed with Laura Schmidt for many years. It is the advice of her fellow



patient Noll, whom Laura met at the Jannsen Clinic in Lübeck in the 1990s. There, in the psychiatric ward, Noll and her confidante Olga Rehfeld created a refuge of stories, a space of literature, reading, writing and quoting - for comfort or as an escape from the abysses of the past? Laura gradually realises that the clinic where she herself found help was destructive for Rehfeld. She decides to illustrate one of Rehfeld's texts, to draw her life story, to pass it on. Something of Rehfeld should remain, of her and other people who spent almost their entire lives in the clinic.

With a fascinating cast of patients and medical staff, Svealena Kutschke tells the story of psychiatry as a place where deep vulnerability pushes humanity to its limits. As a place that became a gateway to violence, especially during the Nazi and post-war periods. As an echo chamber of German history. Medical diagnoses, Kutschke reminds us, say a lot about the society in which they are made. And she asks whether the psychological state of emergency is not an appropriate reaction to the impositions of society. A novel that brings light into the darkness like a spook fish in the deep sea.

A harrowing factual novel about a unique case of contemporary Austrian history



'Thousand-Year Empire' are numbered. Within a very short space of time it has shrunk to nothing, and on the edge of this nothingness stands the Red Army, waiting until the battle for Vienna is decided. Where everything is long too late, but not yet over, district leader Johann Braun sets up his own personal court martial, a private murder regime. People with whom he or one of his helpers has a score to settle are arbitrarily sentenced, 'politically unreliable', supposed deserters, men and women, old and young, people who are in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Martin Prinz tells of the monstrous, soberly and in keeping with the facts. This is possible because the murderers of that time were put on trial shortly afterwards. Because the monstrosity was analysed in painstaking detail. And because two people who came within a whisker of being involved in the events, one as the perpetrator, the other as the victim, were never left in peace for the rest of their lives.



Nora Rischer is sitting in the treatment chair of a fertility clinic when an email reaches her: racist incident at our university. She is curious, anticipating outrage — and taken aback: Is this about her own German studies seminar? Rischer is shocked. The sign 'Closed until further notice' hung outside for a long time until Elisabeth made the decision to continue running the bakery. She does it alone. Every morning she fires up the oven, stirs the dough, puts the loaves in the oven - and surprises the whole village and herself. Alois' farm in the same neighbourhood. A farm that has been in the family for generations, Alois was not asked if he wanted to take it over. He lives with the dog, ignores the expectation of starting a family - but something is tightening. Perhaps it has something to do with Camenzind. Meanwhile, a young woman returns to the village; the three steps to the bakery run themselves. She fetches the key to the summer house from her grandparents; it is to be sold. She sees everything again, the mountain ridge, the valley, the balcony with the drawbridge. Soon, it seems to her, the house begins to speak to her. The novel follows three characters who know nothing about each other and yet are connected - through the area, the village and the pressing question of how things should actually continue. Stubborn traces of the past have become entrenched in them, but then something starts to move. In her linguistically dense debut, Mariann Bühler observes how change finds its way and shifts happen that were never intended, sometimes even moving mountains.



Svenja, on the other hand, loves making lists, and she loves working through them point by point even more. Today, she has to pick up the wedding rings, because her wedding is planned for three weeks from now. What's not on her list? Going on a road trip with a goldsmith named Etna.

Two women together in a car, singing along to the songs of their youth, on their way to meet the first potential father – because Etna can't possibly raise the child on her own, having promised to devote all her energy to fair trade gold. Soon the two realize that they have much more in common than just their year of birth.

With plenty of wit and drive, Karin Rey tells the story of breaking out of the unease of the world as it is. Something has to change, that much is clear – and so the two begin to search for a good father, uprooting neophytes and already knowing how to set up a fair production line. A committed and at the same time lighthearted debut!

After the death of his mother, the narrator finds an album in a drawer containing photos of his early childhood, which he spent on the Caribbean island of Trinidad and Tobago. As a young woman, the daughter of labourers from Aargau had embarked on an adventure with a good-for-nothing from the West Indian upper class and had a child. While the rest of the family endeavours to erase the memory of her mother's years with the 'savages', the narrator sets out to save this story, which is also his own.

Tobacco and Chocolate takes us to the tropical jungle of a British crown colony in the 1950s and 1960s. As the narrator continues to explore his Indian ancestors, who were shipped to the Caribbean as contract labourers, he uncovers not only a family tree, but also a piece of colonial history. This is juxtaposed with memories of growing up in his grandparents' 'tobacco house' in Aargau and the rapprochement with a mother who always seemed unapproachable during her lifetime.

Between Lebanon and Tyrol: A report on the graffiti scene in Beirut turns into a journey into the dark past of the author's own family. A novel of quiet power!



The contrast could not be greater: Having just been in Beirut, the narrator returns to the mountain village in Tyrol where he comes from. The winter season is over, everything is deserted, and he wants to work in peace on his reportage about the art scene in Lebanon. But Rami, a graffiti artist he met on his trip, awakens memories that go back to his childhood: of Lenz, a one-armed painter from Berlin who came to the village in 1944 to stay.

At the time, he didn't ask any questions, but now he wants to know more. He learns about a camp for forced laborers in the village, a hideout for deserters in the mountains, and the involvement of his grandfather Ludwig, one of the camp guards. Did Ludwig have anything to do with the disappearance of a Ukrainian prisoner who had an affair with his best friend's sister?

She records her first album, with Toronto, Detroit, and Berlin waiting for her. She left Hanover behind long ago – but the possible disease is getting closer. At the latest when she meets Jason and the desire to have children comes up, she has to ask herself whether she should get tested. Whether she wants to know what could determine her life forever. For her, growing old could begin early.



How do you talk about your own mother? Born over a hundred years ago in East Prussia, she fled from the Red Army, arrived somewhere in Western Germany after many detours, and there, in her new life, in the new era after the war, which was soon no longer talked about, she always remained a stranger.
